Adisco, Inc. is a 100% women owned company specializing in precision CNC machining of custom polymer components. Their primary industry applications are medical device and analytical systems and components as well as polymer flow cells for Fluidics and Chromatography applications, said an Adisco spokesperson, but they do have other applications in polymer aerospace and defense product services.

Other services Adisco offers are fusion polymer bonding and vapor polishing, another market with strong potential for substantial growth. Adisco looks forward to working with the NCC to enhance their new technologies.

“The precision machined polymers market is growing and has applications in all of our strategic industries,” said Marty Hohenberger, Vice President of Business Recruitment. “Adisco will be a great addition to the Region and will expand our capabilities in advanced manufacturing.”

An Adisco spokesperson said the company heard great things about the opportunity in the Dayton Region, the available workforce, and chose NCC because of its ability to foster networking, increase the business exposure, and its overwhelming support and commitment to skilled labor, training, and technical focus.

“Adisco’s focus on medical applications brings a new branch of polymer science to NCC, and their precision CNC machining of polymers and composites are a new capability to the entire Region,” said Lisa Novelli. Novelli is the newly named President of the National Composite Center. “We have many exciting things happening at the NCC and we’re all truly excited to see where this new partnership will take us.

The State of Ohio’s focus on small business growth and technology development through state grant programs was also a motivating factor. The state of Ohio provided the opportunity for capital investment with incubation support as well as supporting the personnel skill set demands of the precision CNC industry that had restricted growth potential in the past.

“Adisco is a small company with a large footprint in CNC machining.
