





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## Session Descriptions



**Welcome and Overview of Collective Impact, Equity and Social Determinants of Health** - The session will provide an overview and introduction to Equity, Collective Impact, the value of public and private partnerships, the Montgomery County's Community Health Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan. The session will highlight how Montgomery County has come together to address some of our most complex concerns.

**A Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) Approach to Achieve Health Equity** - This presentation will define SDoH and equity, explore how institutional racism has shaped them, and describe how a SDoH approach is needed to achieve health equity.

**How Do We Address the Social Determinants of Health? Table Discussions** - Participants will debrief the previous presentation about equity and discuss ideas of how we can collectively work to better address social determinants of health within the community.

**Adopting Collective Impact as an Approach to Address Social Determinants of Health and Promote Health Equity: Can we do it? Will it work? Is it worth it?** - This session will highlight community case studies and offer discussion on the successes, difficulties, and lessons learned in using a collective impact approach to address the opioid crisis across Ohio, including the need to examine and address the social determinants of health and health inequities that often impact opiate use disorder. Finally, this session will pose three important questions about using the collective impact approach - "Can I do it? Will it work? Is it worth it?"

**System-Led Initiatives** - Presenters will discuss the origins and operations of both initiatives, providing insights into their structure and outcomes and ways others can still get involved.

**Miami Valley Equity Profile and Initiatives** - In 2019, the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) launched the Institute for Livable & Equitable Communities, a Regional initiative that convenes critical private and public partners from all sectors and serves as the central point of coordination for a long-term, multi-faceted effort to address livability and equity in our Region. MVRPC staff will discuss equity gaps in our community and identify ways community members are addressing those gaps. *Presenters: Brian Martin, Martin Kim and Stacy Schweikhart*

**Equity Fellows and Equity in Education** - This session examines how advocates for a more equitable and livable community can begin to foster change by both understanding the root causes of disparity gaps and engaging in organizational self-assessments of practices and policies that contribute to inequities. The presenters will also discuss the successes and challenges that have occurred while engaging in this equity work.

**Collective Impact 101** - This session will introduce participants to the five conditions of collective impact, along with the principals and leadership models necessary to make collective impact work.
