Director's Statement

I am pleased to report that for FY 19 MonDay achieved its main goals of 675 diversions, maintained 30 Post Release Control (PRC) male beds, and a 74% successful completion rate. None of this would be possible without the tremendous job our staff do daily to operate the facility efficiently and safely while addressing the criminogenic needs of our residents. Their professionalism creates an environment in which the residents feel safe to learn the skills they need to live a life of purpose and meaning in recovery.

The past year has not been without its challenges, namely we had two separate escapes from the facility – the first in over 20 years. We learned from both and have taken the necessary measures to improve our security procedures, reinforced facility structural shortcomings and made technical updates. In both instances no staff were injured which we are very thankful for and all escapees were apprehended by law enforcement.

We were able to accomplish the majority of our initiatives for FY 19 (see *Highlights Section*). Most notably we had a very successful ACA audit and a Correctional Program Checklist (CPC) Evaluation conducted by the University of Cincinnati. Of particular note – we did exceptionally well on the CPC receiving an overall score of 87% which places us in the *Very High Adherence to EBP* category. When compared to other programs, MonDay stands head and shoulders above the average (see page 5). In short, this evaluation demonstrates that MonDay has the internal components of both capacity and content to intervene with residents and to successfully address their criminogenic thinking and behavior.

We are thankful for the Montgomery and Clark/Greene/Madison Counties ADAMHS Boards, and the Clermont County Probation Department through its JRIG funding, for reimbursing us for psychotropic medications prescribed to the residents from their respective counties. We also want to recognize Samaritan Behavioral Health for working with us to provide Narcan Kits and more importantly Vivitrol shots for Montgomery County Residents who volunteer for it. Finally, the Wright State University SARDI program study is drawing to a conclusion and we will have the final outcome findings report by the beginning of 2020. To date the preliminary findings are rather encouraging and emphasize the importance a peer led recovery system has on improving a resident's chance for success upon returning to the community.

The State has switched its budget cycle from a 1 year to 2 years starting with FY 20 and FY 21. This will be a challenge for how we manage our fiscal responsibilities but one we are confident that in the long run will allow us to have greater flexibility and discretion in our budgeting process.

We look forward to working toward accomplishing our new set of initiatives for FY 20. Our goal is to keep moving in the direction of not only sustaining what we have achieved to be classified as a **Very High Adherence** performing facility, but also to improve upon those standards.

Summary of Funding

Grant Narrative:

- The RSAT Grant is awarded through the Governor's Office of Criminal Justice Services.
- The ABLE Grant is awarded through the Miami Valley Career Technology Center for services as an Adult Basic and Literarcy Education Program.

Funding included \$7,635,271 awarded from the State Operating Grant, along with \$102,907.10 from the Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) Grant and \$35,000 from the ABLE Grant.




74% of Residents successfully completed the MonDay program

- <u>Residents Screened for Admittance</u> 1,227 residents were screened for the program during FY19.
- Average Daily Population The average daily population was 247.4 with FY18 being 250.1.
- Average Length of Stay The average length of stay for all residents was 130.2 days.
- <u>Cost Per Stay</u> The projected cost per diem (cost per day, per resident) was \$80.80, with the
 actual cost being \$86.07. The projected cost per stay was \$11,311.51 with the actual cost per
 stay being \$11,210.37.
- Comparison Data from State Institutions through FY 19 The per diem cost for a State Institution is \$80.68 with the annual cost being \$29,448.20.


FY19 total volunteer hours were 729.


MonDay's Personnel Status (As of June 30, 2019)
